Pregnancy Testing:

- Urine pregnancy tests (most accurate day of missed menses and beyond) are available as a patient at SHaW or at the SHaW pharmacy, First Response \$15 for 2 tests, and OneStep \$3.06 for 1 test
- Serum (blood) testing available if indicated
- Generally well covered by insurance

Abortion

- The abortion pill is technically 5 pills between two medications, Mifepristine, and Misoprostol. Mifepristine is taken first, it blocks progesterone which is necessary to continue a pregnancy. Misoprostol is taken 24-48 hours later in 4 doses and this induces uterine contractions. Medication abortion is an option up to 11 weeks and can cost up to \$750 but it is often less. Surgical abortion can cost anywhere from \$500-\$2,000. Cost depends on how far along they are, what type of anesthesia will be used, any complications, etc. Beyond 17 weeks it is typically a two-day procedure. Abortion Law in Connecticut

- No abortion shall be performed after viability of the fetus unless necessary to preserve the woman's life or health.
 - O Viability means the fetus is capable of meaningful life outside the woman's body. This varies pregnancy to pregnancy and is not based solely on gestational age
- No mandated waiting period, meaning you can be prescribed the pill on the day of your first appointment.
- Informed consent: a patient must receive information from a counselor and sign a consent form that describes the nature and consequences of the procedure which shall be used.
- No mandated parental consent beyond age 16y.

Abortion Outside of Connecticut

- Laws are very unclear and vary greatly state to state

- Online pharmacies are risky—there is no medical consultation involved, the medications are not regulated, and there have been scams.
